This course explores both historical and contemporary critical issues in Black feminist theory, both in the US and in transnational contexts. If the meaning and boundaries of Blackness are—and always have been—both fluid and contested, then what is the 'Black' in Black feminist theory? Given the contentious history of the 'f-word' among women of color and Third World women activists, how might we conceptualize a 21st Century global Black feminism? Using texts from the nineteenth century to today; from fiction to political theory; and from the US, Europe, Africa, and Asia; we will work together to answer these and other crucial questions.
